World Aids Day

WHAT IS WORLD AIDS DAY?

World AIDS Day takes place on the 1st December each year. It's an opportunity for people worldwide to unite in the fight against HIV, to show support for people living with HIV, and to commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, World AIDS Day was the first ever global health day.

WHY IS WORLD AIDS DAY IMPORTANT?

Over 101,000 people are living with HIV in the UK. Globally, there are an estimated 36.7 million people who have the virus. Despite the virus only being identified in 1984, more than 35 million people have died of HIV or AIDS, making it one of the most destructive pandemics in history.

Today, scientific advances have been made in HIV treatment, there are laws to protect people living with HIV and we understand so much more about the condition. Despite this, each year in the UK around 5,000 people are diagnosed with HIV, people do not know the facts about how to protect themselves and others, and stigma and discrimination remain a reality for many people living with the condition.

World AIDS Day is important because it reminds the public and government that HIV has not gone away – there is still a vital need to raise money, increase awareness, fight prejudice and improve education.

Primary - Maple Class

In Maple Class, we have been doing some very exciting activities this term.

At Halloween, we had a fantastic fancy dress party with games and activities including: Wrap the Mummy, Pin the Nose on the Witch and Pumpkin Carving. The boys had lots of fun!

Careers Update

This term we welcomed Jo Newman our new Careers advisor across the Learn@ Mat Academy. Jo has met with some of the year 11 students at Notton and guided them towards possible college courses.

Jo also came along to the Parent Support Group Coffee Morning

on the 13th November at KnowleDGE.

This was a great opportunity for Jo to meet with parents/carers and explain the various options and support available for their children when moving on from a specialist provision into a more mainstream setting.

A very enjoyable and informative session.

<u>Lackham</u>

During this term at Lackham College the students have done a lot of work with sheep. Often they have worked alongside the Shepherd who works for Lackham.

Duties have included weighing the sheep and giving them a general health check to see which ones are suitable to be sent to market. For this they have to weigh above 45kg and have a good amount of meat on them.

Now is also the time when the ram is put to the ewes in readiness for the lambing season. The students learnt how to mark the rams up with paint on the underside. This paint will then transfer onto the ewe's back when the ram mounts her.

In order for accurate records to be kept, the paint colour is changed each week so that the shepherd can tell exactly which ewes are pregnant. The paint colour can then be used to work out when the lambs are due to be born.







Visit to Avon Rubber PLC

Two staff took a group of three students on a visit to Avon Rubber PLC in Melksham.

Avon Protection is the recognised global leader in advanced Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) respiratory protection systems for the world's Military, Law Enforcement and Fire markets. They produce different types of masks used throughout these industries.

At reception we had to leave all phones and valuables and we were not allowed to take any photographs. We were given a tour of the factory. We were all surprised at how quiet and clean it was. We were shown the various masks made at the factory and were astonished to hear that they have a 20 year guarantee! The quality and comfort of these masks is essential for the military services and masks are produced for use on land, air and sea. Avon have just secured a contract with the MOD to produce masks.

For Law Enforcement they produce air purifying respirators, along with various filters, hoods and powered air hoods.

For the Fire Service they produce thermal image camera technology and self-contained breathing apparatus.

As a staff team, on Thursday 15th November, we wore odd socks. And so did many of our pupils! This was to show our respect and support for Anti-Bullying Week.








Notton House Student Council
