#### **Careers Education at Notton House**



On Friday 11<sup>th</sup> November, former pupil, Ben, visited the school and spoke about his experiences of gaining an apprenticeship and his work and over the past two years. To save Ben from having to formally prepare a presentation, Paul spoke to Ben whilst most of our year 10 and 11 pupils sat and listened. Below is a summary / script of the conversation:

Paul: Hi Ben, let's start by you telling us the highlights of the last two years

Ben: Money, jobs, everything!

Paul: Talk to us about the job – Bricklaying – how did you get into this?

Ben: I started out with some labouring, but I had to do a lot of work online and with phone calls to secure an employer. I must have sent / answered about 200 ads on Facebook, sent messages. It took a while.

Paul: So that got you the workplace. You then needed to secure an apprenticeship, how did you manage that?

Ben: I found out about On-Site, Bristol through using Career Pilot, and applied directly.

Paul: I remember this, you had the interview over a screen in my office. I was nervous for you.

Ben: Me too.

Paul: How would you prepare for this knowing what you do now?

Ben: I struggled answering some of the questions. Revise what you want to do, find out more, make sure it's what you want to do. Write down some obvious responses to questions like: 'why do you want an apprenticeship?'.

Paul: You did well considering, and now look, two years into your apprenticeship. Can you talk us through a day at work?

Ben: 8am start, muck up, busy until 4:30pm, lots of pressure to finish. Most of the work is block work/laying bricks, mixing mortar. I work as part of a group of 12 people, it's a good team.

Paul: Talk to us about leaving Notton and becoming independent.

Ben: It was a big step leaving Notton, but good to get straight into site work. I passed my driving test yesterday, so that feels like the final step towards complete independence. Car insurance is £4000 though, so I have to work hard to cover that.

Paul: Can you tell us more about the apprenticeship, because a few pupils are looking at that option?

Ben: It's a three-year course, I'll finish in September 2023 at level 2, with the option of going onto a level 3 course. Personally, I think I'll move into paid site work then. I attend college 1 day per week and get paid £5.31 per hour. There is an end point assessment which is a two-day test. It includes spoken questions and two practical projects: an arch and a double-skinned wall.



Paul: What's the worst things about the work/apprenticeship?

Ben: The pay, it's okay, but not a lot considering the length of days, pressure to work and how tired I am at the end of every day. Summer is better than winter, it's hard work outdoors in the cold. I have started making some extra money with independent work.

Paul: Can you give examples of that?

Ben: Me and a mate have set up a small business and advertise/respond to requests on Facebook groups. Our most recent job was to build a retaining wall and patio; £1500 for two day's work.

Paul: What a great set-up. What's next then?

Ben: I'll finish my apprenticeship in September and move onto fully paid site work. Currently on a big site in Yate, some of the builds are planned to take about ten years. I'll keep growing the independent work as well and aim to go fully self-employed at some point in the future.

Paul: Ben, thanks so much for talking here today.

During outdoor learning this term both classes have visited The Arc. We challenged ourselves on the bouldering wall and tried the different levels to see how far we could travel.






We enjoy our outdoor space, making a boat to float was great fun especially as we have had so much rain.








#### **Pewsey Class**



In Science, the class has been studying biology and looking at the human reproductive system.




In PE the class has been using the fitness suite, playing badminton, and basketball.



#### Term 3 with Ben, Becky and Mollie


SMSC this term we have been looking at the country of Niger in West Africa. The boys have been looking into facts about the country, the population, and child rights.

Your Staff that came to my aid and I apologize for not getting anyone's names were fantastic, they took care of me and my daughter who was very worried about me, they called me an ambulance too.




